FROM THE DEAN....

Dear Friends

I really must start this letter with a huge thank you to everyone who helped make last Saturday's convocation a success. We had really fine organ voluntaries, rousing hymns, and poignant readings, followed by a delightful luncheon, complete with a speaker. So thanks to Nancy Landsman and Pat Hussy for organizing the meal as well as to all who brought food. Thanks to Shirley Curry, Stewart Shuster, Jim Strand and Ed Larson who planned the program. Also to those who played: Ann Hartzler, Scott Vallaincourt, and John Corrie as well as to those who read: Lucy Ingraham, Peter Stickney, and Henry Ahlers, and of course our informative and entertaining speaker, Chester Cooke.. It was an inspiring and invigorating morning.

You have probably noticed that there was a huge omission in my list of thanks. This was intentional. And while we are contemplating ways to encourage one another, let's take one positive concrete step. Now that we have a web site, let's get all our individual projects posted so that we can show up for one another's programs. Obviously we're busy people, but with the coming

Christmas season, there will be plenty of opportunities for us to share our offerings. Please forward your items to me as soon as you can and we'll get them posted.

Ed Larson has agreed to serve as Sub-Dean for the remainder of the season, and Tom Mueller has kindly offered to take on the newly created position of Web Master. Organ Students!

I am recruiting students for our Master of Sacred Music program at the University of Notre Dame. We are extremely excited about what is going on here. The degree combines music (two organ recitals, organ literature, music history) and liturgy courses. There are details of the program on the website: http://www.nd.edu/~msm/

There are eight organ students in the MSM program—four in each class. The program is extremely competitive (we had eighteen applications last year for four slots), and the level of playing is extremely high. The assistantships pay full tuition for two years plus a stipend of \$12,500 per year for two years. Typically a student on an assistantship works in the Basilica of the Sacred Heart on campus.

All students in our MSM program are supported with tuition grants. If you know of any prospective undergraduate students or others who are not currently enrolled in a graduate program, I would appreciate hearing from you. If you have any names to suggest, I am happy to contact them.

Plenty remains for us all to do to celebrate and promote awareness of the King of Instruments. Please forgive the 'mass mail' format of this communication. I would like to offer a suggestion that I encourage you to share with all of your AGO chapter members.

Though we might imagine that, after 28+ years on the air, American Public Media's PIPEDREAMS is a known quantity to everyone, in reality it's not. And even though the internet offers a convenient, time-independent access point for online PIPEDREAMS listening (18,500 discrete users monthly), the largest audience by far is reached through radio broadcast transmissions (over 220,000 weekly).

You can help increase awareness of the country's only nationally distributed organ music radio broadcast...and, in doing

so, increase public awareness of and interest in organ music! Simply include some basic promotional information in available cost-free outlets. Think of this action as being as important as listing the date and time of your own performance event in a PR release.

Where/When? In any and every program you print for any local organ recital you sponsor or perform; also in church bulletins or newsletters, particularly in a week for which you are planning some special organ music. Make this a regular 'insertion,' so that the message has a chance to 'sink in.'

What? Consider a brief paragraph, something like these (below), if you live somewhere that weekly PIPEDREAMS broadcast can be heard on radio:

Enjoy organ music in its infinite variety each week with PIPEDREAMS from American Public Media, heard [day, time, station call-letters, frequency and city]. For more information: [local station web address]. Also listen to PIPEDREAMS on the internet at any time (24/7) at www.pipedreams.org.

ELIGIBILITY: Any student of the organ, piano, orchestral instrument or voice who is a resident of greater Portland,



including Portland, South Portland, Scarborough, Westbrook, Cape Elizabeth, Falmouth, Gorham and Cumberland and who is between the ages of 10-18 (grades 4-12) and 19-25.

DEADLINE: All applications must be postmarked by Friday December 17, 2010.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE:

Applications will be reviewed and applicants will be contacted as to the time and location of their audition.

Auditions will be held on March 12, 2011. Participants must provide their own accompanists. One copy of each selection must be provided for the committee.

AWARD: Up to \$2,000 will be shared among the applicants chosen by the Scholarship Awards Committee based on the following criteria: Musicianship, age appropriate technical skill level, musicality and deportment. The amount of the award(s) and the number of recipients selected will be at the discretion of the Scholarship Awards Committee. Decisions of the Scholarship Awards Committee are final. Auditions will be closed.
