### First Chapter Meeting Convocation

#### 2013 AGO Convocation

On September 21, 2013, twenty AGO members and friends came together and to share experiences and rededicate ourselves to the pursuit of learning and teaching music. It was a joy to hear members play the beautiful Hutchings organ at First Parish – Grace Lewis-McLaren, Ann Hartzler, Ray Cornils and Sean Fleming played the organ. Everybody sang the rousing hymns and a 4-part round (May Your Life Be As a Song). David Bellville, our chaplain, led us in reciting a Psalm, to which we sang responses. We were captivated listening to Sean Fleming perform a rousing Toccata by Languetuit, which was not wellknown. We learned that Brian Wren, the composer of the hymn "Bring Many Names" had lived and preached at the Brunswick Methodist church a few decades ago. We exchanged stories about musical events we performed in and attended this summer - conventions, concerts, musicals, and the Pipe Organ Encounter (POE).

John Sullivan shared his reflections on the POE, which was held this past June. He said that the children truly enjoyed themselves and were not difficult. Twenty kids participated in the POE – 4 from Maine, others from Massachusetts, New York, and New Jersey. Their prior organ experience ranged from minimal to several years of study. The students experienced daily organ instruction, a master class with Katelyn Emerson and an opportunity to shine at the student organ recital. The highlights for those of us who didn't have the opportunity to teach were the faculty recital and Katelyn Emerson's concert. Katelyn, a 'rising star' who remembered how important the POE's were to her, was very generous with her time – she led a master class and performed an amazing concert.

After the convocation, we were invited to watch a "sneak preview" of the 2014 Boston Convention. Ray Cornils, who is on the 2014 AGO convention steering committee, presented a power point slide show of the coming events. The convention will be held on June 23-27, 2014 in center city Boston. #### The AGO Portland Chapter recommends the following fees for Substitute Organists:

**One service** (Organist or Organist/Choir Director) \$150.00 - \$300.00

A second service essentially the same as the first service 50% of first service fee

**Rehearsal** (1 ½ hours maximum) \$60.00 - \$100.00

Additional rehearsals with soloists, choir or instrumentalists \$30.00 -\$100.00/hour, depending on the difficulty of music

**Mileage**- 55 cents/mile if visits to church for practice, rehearsal, service exceed 25 miles/round trip.

**Book Review By Peter Stickney** Mentoring in the Ensemble Arts-Helping Others Find Their Voice by Tim Sharp; Chicago, Illinois, **GIA Publications Inc. Recently I received this book from** Tim Sharp, Current Executive **Director of the American Choral** Directors Association. This is a book about the mentor/protégé relationship and its influence on ensembles and conductors. We all have had mentors and are mentors to others. These relationships can last for a lifetime or for a due season. For example-this week, one of my mentors, now age 91, brought me a wonderful and meaningful present to commemorate a musical goal I have achieved. As a young college musician, this mentor taught me to walk in the harnesses of a church choir director. I learned how to run a choir rehearsal. deal with hired soloists and would-be soloists, plan for the church year, how to drink at the after-choir parties (yes it's true), the art of being a brick wall when advocating for the music and choir program, how to graciously deliver food to nurture a sick or grieving choir member, observe the solemnity of a death or new life, and most of all, how to use the energy and talents one has been given to be the best one can be and create beautiful sound with what is available to work with.

Tim Sharp's book expresses the special relationship of mentor and protégé, and is well balanced in regard to representing the unique duties and expectations of both roles.

The book is organized in three distinct sections: RECITATIVEwhich addresses the mentoring environment of the ensemble, ARIOSO-which defines mentoring, and addresses mentoring and the reasons for mentoring, and ARIA-the meat and potatoes of mentoring.

Sharp hooks us in with the mid-1460's example of a young Leonardo da Vinci leaving his home to be apprenticed to the sculptor Andrea del Verrocchio. The learning environment of the bottega, or workshop, formed the basis for Leonardo da Vinci's development as a skilled artist. The inference is that many of us are the protégés of a conductor or teacher, and many of us go on to be the mentor of others seeking to learn from us. This book is clear that men-

tors and protégés can be applied to many situations. In other words, mentor and protégé relationships are legion, being diverse in nature, situation, and either formal or informal. Mentor and protégé relationships can be for a short term or last a lifetime. The stated goal of the book is "to help the conductor realize the full potential of the mentor/protégé relationship and to assist both mentor and protégé in achieving the best possible benefits of these relationships." Sharp states that the result will be better music making and more fulfilled human beings for generations to come. This rings true to this reader.

Perhaps the most important feature of this book is that each chapter ends with a "Thought Experiment". While the exercises listed can be a thought experiment, perhaps they would be better labeled as a meditation or even reflection. Nonetheless, each "Thought Experiment" is carefully and wisely crafted.

From a personal level I enjoyed the wonderful diverse quotes at the beginning of each new chapter. I am humbled to say that I was unfamiliar with many of them. I like them ALL! These are all worthy of contemplation and imitation. In closing, I want to express gratitude for this book. I was expecting a "how to" book on *mentoring.* What I received was not a "how to" book, but a book of reflection and inspiration. It would behoove many of us who conduct ensembles to revisit the mentor-protégé relationship in the ensemble arts. I would encourage you to embrace the "Thought Experiments" and become truly self- reflective and self-aware of who you are as a mentor/protégé.
